Learning outcomes

- Explain what is meant by the word *littérature*.
- Distinguish among the various genres: le roman, le conte/la nouvelle, le théâtre, and la poésie.
- Scan lines of poetry in French and identify stylistic devices such as *la métaphore*, *la comparaison*, *l'enjambement*, *l'anaphore*, etc.
- Discuss elements of *l'amour courtois* (courtly love) in *Le lai du laustic*.
- Discuss elements of *la poésie lyrique* in two ballads by François Villon.
- Describe the Renaissance world view in the writings of Rabelais, Du Bellay, and Ronsard.
- Analyze a few fables by La Fontaine and a play by Molière.
- Discuss elements of satire in a conte by Voltaire.
