Overview

Counsellors provide assessment and intervention across the lifespan. Children and adolescents are the focus of counselling as often as adults, and working with them requires knowledge of their physical, emotional, and cognitive development. On completion of this course, students will be able to integrate their theoretical approach to counselling, knowledge of human development, and a systemic view of the child and his or her relationship with family, school, society, and culture. Interventions will include verbal and non-verbal approaches to counselling. This course will provide the conceptual foundation necessary for students to undertake supervised practicum experience intervening with children and adolescents.
